

## Minutes of the 2014 Annual Meeting of the Georgia Entomological Society

### Executive Committee Meeting Minutes

#### April 09, 2014. Hampton Inn and Suites, Valdosta, GA

Attending: Gerald Harrison (President), Alan Harvey (Past-President), Stan Diffie (Secretary-Treasurer), Scott Horn (President-Elect), Ed Mondor (2015 Site Selection), Mark Blackmore (Local Arrangements), David Buntin (JES), Kris Braman (Guidelines Committee), Nancy Hinkle (Historian), and David Riley (Awards & Recognition ).

Local Arrangements Report (Mark Blackmore) – Registration was held in the Hampton Inn lobby from 4-6 pm. Registration on Thursday and Friday will be held in the Rainwater Conference Center outside of the Gazebo Room. Lunch will be held in the Gardenia Room and the posters will be set up in the Azalea Room. Jim Dutcher has already set up the boards for the posters. Valdosta State colleagues and students will assist with loading presentations and running AV equipment.

Program Committee (Scott Horn) – There was good communication between Gerald, Stan, Mark, Jim Dutcher, and Scott in planning for the program. The early announcement was sent in November 2013 with a follow-up announcement sent in January 2014. Scott asked if the timing and frequency were appropriate and the committee concurred. Deborah Harvey Graphics in Statesboro printed the programs; 90 copies were printed. Included were 5 papers in the Forestry Symposium, 6 MS papers, 4 PhD papers, and 19 professional papers. Ted Cottrell's paper was moved to the last paper on Friday due to some unavoidable circumstances. The industry panel was given 45 minutes on the program. Gerald said that should be enough time. The schedule was set so that the meeting should conclude by 11:30 am, giving people time to check-out of the hotel before noon. Pesticide re-certification forms will be set up at the registration desk. Five hours credit will be given in Private and Commercial (categories 21, 23, 24, 27).

Meeting Registration (Stan Diffie) – Forty-three regular members pre-registered for the meeting along with 19 students and 1 emeritus member. A recent call for RSVP without pre-registering yielded 5 members and 3 spouses.

Site Selection (Ed Mondor) – Ed presented 4 locations and asked that the committee narrow the choices to two prior to the business meeting. The choices included: (1) Springhill Suites in Statesboro. Food can be brought into the conference center from any caterer, free breakfast for guests, reasonable room rate, GSU has a new golf course nearby, total will be around \$4000-5000 (2) GSU Bioscience Building. Meeting will have to be held the week of March 16-20 which coincides with the GSU Spring Break. David Buntin said this will conflict with the Southeastern Branch meeting. (3) Villa by the Sea Jekyll Island. Venue is quiet and secluded, but the cost would be almost double the cost of Statesboro. Catering alone (2 breakfast, 1 lunch, and 3 breaks) would be around \$6000. Guest rooms are more expensive also. (4) Tybee Island. Maybe a little cheaper than Jekyll. David Riley asked about cutting breakfast from the Jekyll Island venue to make it more appealing. Concern was raised about 'cheapening' the meeting as it seems most people remember things such as food and location as much as the papers. Mark asked about Savannah hotels but was told they have become cost prohibitive. Nancy asked if outside dining will be available at Jekyll Island and it appears that is a possibility. Executive Committee decided to ask the membership to choose between Jekyll Island and Springhill Suites Statesboro. Possible dates will be April 8-10 or April 15-17.

Awards & Recognition (David Riley) – Nominees for Fellow included Dan Horton, Steve Brown, and David Adams. Nominees for Founder included Dick Chalfant, Bill Wiseman, and Bruce Wallace. The committee

selected Dan Horton and Dick Chalfant. David Riley will present the Founder's Lecture. He noted that it was very enlightening to put together the lecture. After the lecture, he will present plaques to Dick Chalfant and Dan Horton.

GES Scholarship (Alan Harvey) – The committee received only a few applicants. The work in revising the Guidelines should benefit this committee in the future. Brian Little was selected to receive the MS Scholarship and Anita Shrestha will receive the PhD Scholarship.

Journal of Entomological Science Annual Report (David Buntin)—The journal published 4 issues last year with an acceptance rate of 85%. Acceptance occurred in 80 days and publication was 290 days. The journal appeared to lose \$5000 last year which is the 4<sup>th</sup> year in a row of losses. The journal had \$31,000 in expenses and \$26,000 in income last year. The journal faces a fundamental problem of no on-line presence. Sheridan Press is the current publisher and is very expensive in regards to on-line publication. Southwest Entomologist uses an independent publisher which may reduce publishing costs. David Riley volunteered to contact Florida Entomologist for information about their publication costs. Scott Horn asked about raising page charges but was told JES is already on the higher side when compared to other journals. A couple of members said they do not get the journal and asked about delivery. There appears to be a disconnect between the GES Secretary, the JES Editor, the JES Business manager, and Sheridan Press. David Buntin will look into this. Wayne Gardner has decided to remain as editor for a few more years. David will assist as needed.

Operating Guidelines (Kris Braman) – Guidelines were last updated in 2002 so the committee began the task of revising the guidelines. This task has been completed except for one last reading by the chairs of the committees. After this, the document will be submitted for publishing on the web. Most changes were simple and logistical; however, some chairs have done some extensive revising. Article 7 states Emeritus will pay 50% of the regular members' registration. Because the registration increased this year, the dues will need to be increased next year for Emeritus members. One section states that GES pay 40-70% of its annual income to JES. However, the JES has a nice reserve on-hand and this statement has not been followed in recent years.

Nominations Committee Report (Dan Horton) – it was hard to get people to agree to run for office. The committee was finally able to get Michael Toews and Will Hudson to run for President-Elect.

Financial Report (Stan Diffie) – The financial report for 2013 was presented (attached). The audit committee had reviewed the books and had approved such. There was a \$3000 loss last year which prompted a vote to raise the registration fee and dues for this year. It appears to be enough to prevent a financial loss in 2014. To date, \$9000 in income has been realized which is \$500 more than all of 2013.

GES Website (Stan Diffie)—Cindy Tucker (UGA-CAES) serves as webmaster and has been very agreeable to make changes as submitted.

## **Final Business Meeting Minutes**

**April 09, 2014. Hampton Inn and Suites, Valdosta, GA**

Gerald Harrison presided over the Final Business Meeting of the 78<sup>th</sup> annual GES meeting. He recognized the outstanding work by Scott Horn and Stan Diffie during the year. He also recognized the support of industry in our society.

Reading of the 2013 Minutes were waived by a motion from Nancy Hinkle and second by Stormy Sparks.

Audit Committee (Stormy Sparks) – Stormy presented the audit report (attached).

Secretary/Treasurers Report (Stan Diffie) – The financial report covering activity in 2013 (attached) was distributed and discussed. Stan Diffie reported a loss of \$3000 last year but expressed optimism that this year will finish in the black due to the increase in dues and registration.

Insect Survey (Phillip Roberts) – Phillip gave an update as to the 7 newest invasive species (attached).

Golf Tournament (Phillip Roberts) -- Past meetings have seen 30 members participate but the tournament was cancelled this year due to a lack of participation—only 3 members signed up to play. A suggestion from the floor to include disc golf next year was entertained.

Fun Run (John All) – There were 14 participants in the Fun Run on the Azalea City Trail. Joni Blount finished first with a time of 21 minutes and an un-named member finished in 48 minutes.

Site Selection (Ed Mondor) – Ed presented Springhill Suites Statesboro and Villa by the Sea Jekyll Island as the two choices. Springhill Suites rooms will be about \$90 per night and no parking fee will be charged. Villa by the Sea rooms will be around \$109 with a \$6 parking fee. Ed showed YouTube videos of both locations. David Buntin made a motion to meet at Jekyll Island and it was seconded by Ash Ahmad. A hand vote was taken and the motion passed. Ed will check to see if room rates can be extended past the meeting dates.

Snapp Award – The Snapp Award, for best presentation by a regular member, was presented by Keith Griffith to Michael Toews.

Guidelines Committee (Kris Braman) – The Guidelines is a 50 page document for committees and officers. The language is being updated and revisions are being made. It will be sent to the chairs one more time before being published on-line.

Nominations Committee (Dan Horton) – the nominees for President-elect were Will Hudson and Mike Toews. Votes were tabulated Friday morning and Will Hudson received the most votes.

Journal of Entomological Science (David Buntin) -- David Buntin reported the journal published 4 issues last year (report is attached). Some people (3 who were present) are not receiving the journal and this will be investigated. Wayne Gardner will stay on as editor for a few more years. The most recently published volume, Volume 48, had 32 scientific articles and 11 notes. The acceptance rate is 85%. The lack of an on-line presence may be hurting the submission rate. If the journal moves to an on-line version, it may cost \$10-

12 K to get back issues put on the web. Mike Toews suggested raising page charges to cover these costs. The reserve budget is down \$5000 from last year but still has \$40,000.

Resolutions (Ann Amis) – the resolutions (attached) were read.

Gerald Harrison passed the gavel to Scott Horn.

Scott Horn presented Gerald Harrison a plaque in gratitude for his service as GES President.

New Business. Stormy Sparks reported that in 2010 the membership voted to limit the term of the Secretary/Treasurer to one 3 year term. As past Secretary/Treasurer, Stormy felt that needed to be re-visited. David Buntin made a motion to change the limit to TWO 3 year terms. Nancy Hinkle seconded and the motion was carried.

Meeting was adjourned.

# JOURNAL OF ENTOMOLOGICAL SCIENCE

## 2013 ANNUAL REPORT

Submitted 07 April 2014

Volume 48 of the *Journal of Entomological Science* was published in 4 issues which were mailed on 7 January 2013 (issue no. 1), 3 April 2013 (issue no. 2), 29 July 2013 (issue no. 3), and 28 October 2013 (issue no. 4). Cover photos for each of the issues were provided by Cheri Abraham (no. 1), Andrew Nuss (no. 2), Raymond Hix (no. 3), and Dan Suiter (no. 4). These were selected from among the entries in the 2013 GES Photo Salon.

There were 364 total pages with 32 scientific articles, 11 scientific notes, 3 author guidelines, and author and subject indices comprising the entire volume. For those 43 manuscripts published in volume 48, the average time from receipt of the manuscript to action taken on acceptance was 80 days, and the average time from receipt to actual publication was 289 days (9.5 months). A summary of these data by volume from 2001 through 2013 can be reviewed in Table 1.

During 2013, 45 manuscripts were submitted for publication in the Journal. The acceptance rate was 85%. A summary by year of total submissions, acceptance rate, and journal account balances and net income is in Table 2.

Susan Thornhill, Business Manager for JES, reported a balance \$45,789.26 in the *Journal* account at Regions Bank (Griffin, GA) as of 28 February 2013. Deposits and disbursements for the account were as follows:

## 2014 Insect Survey Committee Report

(Phillip Roberts, Mark Abney, Stormy Sparks, and Will Hudson)

The 2013 insect pest year was a year of extremes. Lepidopteran pests (corn earworm, tobacco budworm) were extremely low in most crops whereas true bug populations were above average (sap beetles in peaches and corn, three cornered alfalfa hopper in peanut and soybean, and stink bug in corn and cotton). Thrips numbers were at very high levels in peanuts (migration from alternate hosts to row crops occurred later than normal).

### **Invasive insect pests continue to be a growing concern.**

1. *Megacopta cribraria* – now detected in 12 states and District of Columbia. Egg parasitoid, *Pararelenomus saccharalis*, found in Georgia and parts of Alabama and South Carolina.
2. Brown marmorated stink bug – found in many areas of Georgia. Some nuisance reports, very little damage to crops.
3. Spotted wing drosophila – economic pest of blueberries; extensive sprays in blueberries have led to secondary pest outbreaks such as scales, mites, and whiteflies.
4. Bermuda stem maggot – progress in management.
5. European pepper moth.
6. African fig fly – potential pest of soft fruits.
7. Tawny crazy ant – found near Albany.
